State of Pennsylvania County of Beaver &c - Be it known that before me the subscriber a Justice of the Peace in & for said County duly authorized (by law) to administer oaths personally appeared John Patterson a resident of North Beaver Township in said County aged Eighty five years, who (being) first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath state, that he is a brother of Andrew Patterson deceased late of the Township of Machoning & County of Mercer State of Penn^a, that his brother the said Andrew Patterson, was a Locksmith (by trade) and served as Gunner or Locksmith in the war of the revolution in the Line of the State of Penn^a a period of about three years, (as this deponent believes) in a Regiment of Artillery & Artificers that the said Andrew Patterson received 200 acres of bounty land from the state of Pennsylvania as a reward for his services in the war of the revolution, is a fact well known to this deponent; that said land is situated jointly in the Counties of Beaver & Mercer in said State, & in the Townships of North Beaver & Machoning, the latter last named Township being the place where the said Andrew Patterson died, & the first named, the place where his widow Margaret Patterson died.

This deponent further states that he was present at, & witnessed the Marriage of the said Andrew Patterson with Margaret Patterson, whose maiden name was Margaret Dickson; that said marriage occurred (from the best of this deponent's recollection & belief) in the year seventeen hundred and eighty five (1785) that they were married by a Presbyterian Clergyman, in the Barrens of York County in said State and lived together in lawful wedlock from the time of said marriage, up to the time of the death of the said Andrew Patterson, and had children born, whose names are; Mary, Peggy, Samuel

Andrew, William, Betty, Patty, Sarah & Robert
Patterson; are facts well known to this deponent,

and that the said Margaret Patterson did
not intermarry after the death of her husband

In the District Court for the County of Allegheny held on this fourth day of May 1848 personally appeared Andrew Patterson, a resident of the Township of Washington in the County of Mercer & State of Pennsylvania aged fifty seven years who being duly sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to obtain the amount due to the heirs of Margaret Patterson deceased under the act of Congress passed 7th of July 1838.

This declarant states that he is a son of Andrew Patterson deceased a soldier of the revolution; that his said father died in the Township where this declarant resides on the third (3^d) day of May in the year eighteen hundred and twenty eight (1828). This declarant further states from information and belief derived from his said father; that the said Andrew Patterson served in the war of the revolution a period of three years, in a Regiment of Artillery & Riflemen, in the Penn^a Line, under the command of Colonel Benj^r Flowers; that he served as a Lieut Smith, ^{of Summers} during the time he was enlisted in said war, and was stationed in the vicinity of Carlisle, Penn^a while in said service - that his said father when he enlisted, enlisted to serve three years or during the war, and was discharged about the close of said war, after having served as above stated; that he received two hundred acres of bounty land from the State of Penn^a in compensation for his revolutionary services; that said land is situated jointly in the Counties of Mercer & Beaver in said State and was occupied by his said father and mother up to the time of their death, since which time it has been occupied by their heirs.

This declarant further states that his said father in his life time never applied for a pension, that the affidavit of his said father was once taken to prove the service of one of his comrades, in the revolution, of the name of Thomas Ligt late a pensioner, and resident of the County of Beaver in said State, by an examination of said affidavit and the records of the War Department a more particular account of the service of the said Andrew Patterson in the revolution will be made to appear.

This declarant further states that he is a son of Margaret Patterson deceased whose maiden name was Margaret Dickson; that the aforesaid Andrew and Margaret Patterson were married (as this declarant believes) on the second (2^d) day of June in the year seventeen hundred and eighty five (1785), in the County of York & State of Penn^a by a Presbyterian Clergyman whose name is unknown; that the said Andrew and Margaret Patterson lived together in lawful wedlock from the time of their marriage up to the time of the death of the said Andrew, and that the said Margaret did not intermarry after the death of her said husband but did being his widow; that his death occurred on the fifteenth day of May in the year eighteen hundred & forty two (1842). This declarant further states that the annexed record of the marriage of the said Andrew and Margaret Patterson, and births of their children is his said fathers original family record, made by him, and is in his own hand writing, and was made many years since; that it contains as this declarant believes a true statement of the time of his said parents marriage, and births of their children thereon mentioned; that it was so regarded,

children thereon mentioned; that it was so regarded,

by the said Andrew and Margaret Patterson during their life time, and was the only written evidence on which they relied for the date of their marriage and births of their children; that said record was kept in the possession of his said father up to the time of his death, since which time it has been preserved in the possession of this declarant's mother & one of her children.

This declarant further states that the said Andrew and Margaret Patterson left four children surviving them now living whose names are Margaret Goucher, Samuel, Andrew and Robert Patterson.

This declarant states as his reason for making this declaration out of the County where he resides, is, that no Court of record will be held in his own County for several months to come.

Madam:

I advise you from the Revolutionary War records of this bureau
it appears that Andrew Patterson, while residing in York County,
Pennsylvania, enlisted April 11, 1778, served as artificer in Captain
Thomas Wolfe's Company, Colonel Benjamin Flower's Artillery Artificer
Regiment, was wounded in the wrist (time and nature of wound not
stated) and was discharged after three years' service.

In 1807 he was granted two hundred acres of land by the State
of Pennsylvania, in compensation for the above service.

He died May 3, 1838, in Mahoning Township, Mercer County,
Pennsylvania. His age is not stated.

The soldier married, June 2, 1785, in York County, Pennsylvania,
Margaret Dickson.

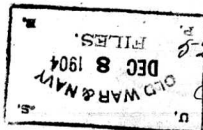

death part of it came into possession of my grandfather Andrew Patterson, who lived on it for many years.

After the death of my great grandfather and also of his widow the heirs (of

whom my grandfather, Andrew Patterson, was one) received certain money from the government that was due the widow in her lifetime or the children

This money for the heirs was collected by an agent from Pittsburg and distributed among them. Besides my grand father, Andrew, other heirs were, Samuel, Robert, William, Margaret Goucher, Betsy Juvet

I'm making the application for this money, the marriage bond from the

old family Bible was taken and
I suppose filed with the record as
it was never returned. I think

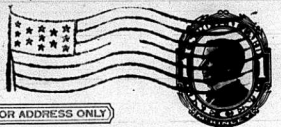

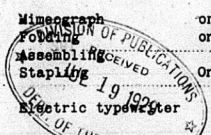
