On this the Twenty second day of November
A.D. 1843 personally appeared before me Samuel C. Bonham
a Judge of the Court of Common Pleas in and for
said County Mary Edgar of Black Bottom Township in said
County aged eighty eight years who being first duly sworn
according to law doth make the following declaration in
order to obtain the benefit of the provisions of the Act of Con-
gress passed July 7th 1838 entitled an Act granting half pay
and pensions to certain Widows.

That she is the widow of Captain James Edgar who per-
formed several tours of duty during the Revolutionary War -

That to the best of her belief he served as first Sergeant
in the volunteer company of Captain McSandless attached to the
Regiment commanded by Colonel Smith under General
Potter - That he marched from York County aforesaid to New
York City near which place they were stationed for a period of
several months, she believes this tour he was out in all three
months and twenty five days from some time about the first
of August A.D. 1776 -

That to the best of her knowledge and belief he
again performed a tour of duty at a place called Camp
Security in York County aforesaid some time in the
Year 1780 or 1781, there was a body of English prisoners kept
there, who were taken from Burgoyne, In this tour he served
as a first Lieutenant in a Company of Drafted Militia for
a period of two months, and the service he performed was
that of guarding prisoners -

That sometime during the year 1782 he was again
in service at Camp Security in said County for a period
of three months - That in this tour he served in the capacity
of Captain to a Company which volunteered to act as a
guard at said fort, that this tour of his service he was

out three months, and the duty he performed was that
of guarding the prisoners taken from Burgoyne and
Cornwallis - That the Officer under whom he served or
to whom Battalion the Company he commanded was at-
tached, was named Ashton and who was at this time
in command at the Fort -

She further declares that she was married to the
said James Edgar sometime during the year 1786 - that
her husband died on the last day of December 1796.
that she was not married to him prior to his leaving
the service, but the marriage took place previous to the
first day of January A.D. 1794 at the time above stated.

She further declares that she has no documentary
evidence to support her declaration, and that from
bodily infirmity she cannot attend Court -



request of a very old lady by the name of
Elizabeth Edgar, widow of James Edgar deceased, I write you,
James Edgar was a pensioner at the time of his
death, & should have had Revolutionary Pension.
Mrs Edgar is now very infirm and as we must
expect knows but little of his husband's service, &
therefore cannot tell under what act, James Edgar
received a pension or the exact time of his death,
but I observed in reading a copy of his will now
within her possession, that he made it, in 1832
and that it was proved December 12th 1836,

His death must have taken place near the last mentioned
period. They were married about 1792 and never
married but once,

She wishes me to enquire of you what amount
is now due her, and what forms will be
required for her to sign to obtain her money.

She claims five years pension from act of Mar 4th
1836, which would terminate on Mar 4th 1841.
Then again for one year, the fourth of March 1843.

Again, four years from Mar 4, 1844, and again from
act of July 29th 1848. A neighbour of hers who has some
scraps of laws relating to pensions has informed her that

She could receive the benefits of all these acts, but
knowing the difficulty attending, obtaining pensions
for such persons, I thought it best to know what
act her husband was pensioned under, and also
under what acts it will be possible for her to obtain
a pension, your favour by answering these interrogatories
and sending the necessary forms or laws for obtaining
this pension, will confer a very great favour upon an old
lady who is now in a miserable poor house, and
also obliged

Your letter to the Hon. James Buchanan of the U. S. Senate relative to Mrs. Edgar's Pension Claim has been placed in my hands - In this letter you say that the claim for the pay of a Captain cannot be allowed without the production of the Commission but only the pay of a non-commissioned Officer. After making effort to discover his commission we are unable to do so. I enclose you however a transcript from the Public Records at Harrisburg purporting to be an arrangement of officers into battalions and a return of said arrangement into the office.

Does not this arrangement and return indicate that the officers named therein had already been elected to the several grades they held and that James Edgar was Captain commanding Company No. 6. of the Eighth Battalion of York County militia?

In Gen: Cass' letter dated War Department Febry 21. 1833 he says "that a commission is not in every case necessary to invest an officer with Rank or command but some act or instrument of writing tantamount to a commission is deemed essential". Does not such an election followed up by proof of actual service as a Captain meet the requirements of this letter? From this evidence it would appear that he was elected to a captaincy and from the testimony already filed that he served as a Captain.

The return indicates that he was entitled to the commission, and the fact of his having been drafted is a recognition of his captaincy, and as such he was subject to the control of the Law.

If you would be pleased to take the case in hand in a day or two, your attention would oblige us, the applicant is very old and feeble and has very frequently urged me to have the case brought to a close.



1843 personally appeared before me the subscriber
a Justice of the Peace in and for said County
dictated James a resident thereof who being
duly sworn according to law doth depose
and say that he was, or acquainted with Capt
James Edgar formerly of said County and in
his lifetime an officer of the Revolutionary War
that during said war there was a large
body of English prisoners stationed for safe
keeping at a place in York County aforesaid
called Camp Security, who were taken from
Prussia and Connell's that during the time
they were kept there which was he believes during
the years 1780-1781, 1782 and part of 1783
this deponent was in the employ of Captain
Grim who was Lieut. an officer and who
furnished the prisoners and their guard with
part of their provisions that it was the duty of
this deponent to assist in conveying these prisoners
to the Camp and to assist in unloading them at
the different places they were wanted in the
Camp, that he continued in this service al-
most all the time the prisoners were there
and within the remembrance several times
every week that he recollects of seeing Captain
James Edgar there as a first Lieutenant in
a Company of drafted militia that the militia
from this County were generally drafted for a
period of two months and that he saw Capt
Edgar there as Lieutenant several times every week
for about that period and afterwards he thinks
saw him there as Captain, and for a while

Sworn according to law doth say that he was
well acquainted with Captain James Edgar for
many years in said County that during the Revolutionary war
he was a private in a Company which volunteered
for service in said war & that said James Edgar
was first Sergeant of the Company that they
were taken into the Regiment commanded by
Colonel Smith and which was attached to the
Command of General Potter that the last time
of the Company was named he thinks Mc
Candless that they were ordered to march to
New York from York County when the Company
was formed and ~~thereafter~~ after having been sta-
tioned in the vicinity of that City as part of
the American army they were discharged and al-
lowed to return home that in this time they were
out the period of three months and twenty
five days and that it took place in the
Summer and fall of the year 1776 and that
said Edgar was in service during the whole of this time
that subsequently in the year 1782 they
he was again in service as a volunteer in
a Company of which said Edgar was Captain
that the services of men capable of bearing
arms were required to guard a large body of
prisoners who were kept at Great Security in
York County Pennsylvania against that he was
was this time in service a period of three
months he is confident &c. as far that period

these services were required and continuous
and that during the whole of this time said
Edgar was then Captain and was in the
Capacity of commanding officer to the Company
the whole time they were on duty and that
the service they performed was that of guarding the
the prisoners taken from Burgoyne & Cornwallis
