The data which follow were obtained from the papers on file in the pension claim, 5.40551, based upon the military service in the Revolutionary War of Christopher Sype.

The date and place of birth and names of the parents of Christopher Sype are not shown.

Obristopher Sype enlisted at Bedford, Pennsylvania, in 1777, served as fifer in Gaptain Harvey's Conpany, under Coleach Piper in the Pennsylvania troops; his company was empaced in the resulting service and restrained several hundred soldiers in different parts of Pennsylvania for service in the Pennsylvania regiments. He was discharged in 1786.

He was allowed pension on his application executed December 8, 1826, at which time he was aged seventy-four years and resided in York County, Pennsylvenia. He stated that he received a pension of \$40,00 per samen from the state of Pennsylvenia.

He died October 10, 1832, place not shown.

There are no data as to the family of Christopher Sype.

Tobias Sype(Soib) was born in 1761, in Tork County, Pénzsylvania. The names of his parents were not given.

While a resident of York Seunty, Pennsylvenia, Tobias Sypeenlisted July 1, 1776, served in Septain Quiggle's Company, Colenel Supple's Pennsylvenia Regiment and was discharged Hevenber 16, 1776. He served in 1783, two menths in Captain Pennington's Company, guarding British priseners at Camp Security, in York County, Pennsylvania.

He was allowed pension on his application executed February 2, 1835, then a resident of York County, Pensylvania, where he had always lived.

He died May 17, 1839.

Tobias Type married in De camber, 1765, in York, Pennsylvania, Assuming or Anna Haria, her maiden name not stated, nor date and place of her birth.

Soldier's wider, Ammer(Anna Haria) Eype, was allowed pension on her application executed September 15, 1839, at which time she was about seventy-four years of age and living in York County, Pouncy/Svenia,

The following data relative to the children of Tobias and Ammey or Anna Maria Sypo are shows:

In 1830, their daughter, Elizabeth Syple(7), of York: County, Fennsylvania, was about fifty-four years of age, and their son, John Sype, was of York County, in 1845 and stated that he was born in October, 1791. Hames of the other children are not designated.

REGULATIONS UNDER THE ACT OF JUNE 7, 1832.

The following regulations have been adopted:
This law has been construed to extend, as well to the line, as to every branch of the Staff of the Army, Anns naw has been construct to extend, as well to the line, as to every branch of the Stan of the Army, and to include under the terms "Continental Line," "State troops," "militiat," and "wolunteers," all persons enlisted, drafted, or who volunteered and who were bound to military service, but not those who persons enisted, dratted, or was volunteered and who were bound to military service, but not those who were occasionally employed with the army upon civil contracts, such as Clerks to Commissaries and to Store Keepers, &c., Teamsters, Boatmen, &c. Persons who served on board of private armed vessels are also excluded from the benefits of the law, as well as persons who turned out as patrols, or were engaged in guarding particular places at night, and were not recognized as being in actual military service. Four general classes of cases are embraced in this law:

The Regular Troops.

Reference is made to your letter in which you request information in regard to Tobias Sype of York County, Pennsylvenia in the Revolutionary War.

The data furnished herein were obtained from pension claim, W. 3366, based upon the service of Tobias Sype in the Revolutionary War.

Tobias Sype (Seib) was born in the year 1761 in York County, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents were not given.

While a resident of York County, Pennsylvania, he enlisted July 1, 1776, served in Captain Quiggle's Company, Colonel Swope's Pennsylvania regiment, and was discharged November 16, 1776. He served in 1783, two months in Captain Pennington's company, guarding British prisoners at Camp Security in York County, Pennsylvania.

He was allowed pension on his application executed, February 2, 1833, then a resident of York County, Pennsylvania, where he had always lived. He died May 17, 1839.

Tobias Sype married in the month of December, 1783 in York, Pennsylvania, Aumney or Anna Maria. Her maiden name is not stated, nor date and place of birth.

The widow, Aumney (Anna Maria) Sype, was allowed pension on her application executed, September 13, 1839, at which time she was about seventy-four years of age and living in York County, Pennsylvania, where she continued to live in 1845.

The following data relative to the children of Tobias Sype and his wife, Aumney or Anna Maria, are found in the claim:

A son " November 20, 1789
A son " October 2, 1791

In 1839, their daughter, Elizabeth Syple(?) of York County, Pennsylvania, was about fifty-four years of age, and their son, John Sype, was of York County in 1843, and stated that he was born in October, 1791. Names of other children not designated.

Reference is made to your letters of December 28, 1937, addressed to The National Archives, in which you request the Revolutionary War records of Churles(or Carl), Henry, Andrew, Philip, Emmunel, Christopher, Jeseph, Tebias and George Michael Sipe(Sipes, Selb, Sype, Sypes, Siab, Siep, etc.), all of whom served in the Pennsylvania troops.

There are no claims for pension on file based upon a ervice in the Revolutionary War of a Philip Sipe who served in the Pennsylvania troops nor of a Charles, Carl, Henry, George Michael, Michael, Andrew, Essenth or Second Sipe. All spellings of that surname were used in the search of the records.

The record of the only George with above surness was furnished you Jamery 4, 1935, as found in the claim for pension, R.9619, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War. Such claims are the source of Revolutionary War data furnished by the Veterans Administration, the custodian of these claims. Your letter was referred to this office for reply because the pension records are here.

The record of one Tobias Sype, only, and of one Christopher Sype, only, both of whom served in the Pennsylvania troops, have been found on the Revolutionary War pension records. Their records are furnished you herewith. It is suggested that information in regard to the military service of the others named above, might be planned from the Adjutant General, War Department, this city, who is contedian of military records.
