On this twenty third day of August of 1833

Personally appeared before me the subscriber one of the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas in and for said County of York in the State of Pennsylvania David Wallmeyer a resident of said County aged seventy four years, who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in Order to Obtain the benefit of an Act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

1 That he Volunteered to serve in Captain John Millers Company in the County of York Pa about the month of September 1777 in the Regiment Commanded by Col. Rankin and marched to Lancaster from thence into Chester County from thence marched to the State of Delaware and within a few miles of Brandywine on the 11th of Sept^r 1777 But was not in the Engagement after which time he marched to Valley Forge and remained in Chester County untill he had served some months and was then discharged near Valley Forge in the month of Jan^y 1778 by Capt Miller

2 That in the year 1782 he was drafted to serve in Capt Fords Company at Camp security in the County of York to guard watch and keep secure the Prisoner taken with Genl Cornwallis that he served for two months the time which he was drafted and was then discharge by Capt Peter Ford about the first of Aprill of the year 1782 That he served altogether at least six months in the Revolutionary war and I further declare that I have no documentary evidence in my possession nor do I know of any persons now living whose testimony I can obtain to prove my service except Charles Wallmeyer and that I do hereby relinquish every Claim whatever to a pension or annuity and declare that my name is not on the pension roll of legency of any state whatever nor did I ever make an Application for a pension or annuity except in the present instance

Answer I lived in York County when called into service and have since in York County ever since the Revolutionary war

Ques by Judge 4 How were you called into service, were you drafted or did you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom
Answer The first time I volunteered the second I was drafted

Ques by Judge 5 State the name of some of the Regular Officers who were with the Troops where you served and the general and Militia Regiments as you can recollect and the general Circumstances of your Service

Answer I was not acquainted with the Regular Officers I was acquainted with Colonel Rankin and several other Militia Officers their names I have forgotten

Ques by Judge 6 did you ever receive a discharge from the service and if so by whom was it given and what has become of it
Answer I received my discharge the first was signed by Capt Miller the other by Capt Rankin

Ques by Judge 7 State the names of some persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood and who can testify as to your Character for Fracty and their belief of your services as a Soldier of the Revolution

Answer Peter Klinefelter John Shaper Philip Rose Henry Kenny John Taylor Charles Matygon Frederick Orwick Jacob Wernemiller are my Neighbours who can testify to my Character for veracity and their belief of my services as a Soldier of the Revolution

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War records of Lewis Shive and David Waltamyer, both pensioners of York County, Pennsylvania.

The data which follow were obtained from the papers on file in pension claims, based upon their services in the War of the Revolution.

Lewis Shive-S.22981

Lewis Shive was born in the year 1760 in York County, Pennsylvania, names of his parents not given.

While residing in said York County, he enlisted and served as a private in the Pennsylvania militia as follows:

From July 1, 1776, two months in Captain Hahn's company, Colonel Swope's regiment; from in September, 1777, two months in Captain Fox's company, Colonel Ewing's regiment; and was in the battle of Germantown; from in July, 1778, three months in Captain Ephraim Pennington's company, guarding prisoners in Reading, Pennsylvania.

He was allowed pension on his application executed October 16, 1833, at which time he was living in York County, Pennsylvania, where he had always lived.

There are no data in this claim concerning the

David Waltamyer was born in the year 1759 in York County, Pennsylvania, names of his parents not given.

While residing in said York County, he enlisted and served as a private in the Pennsylvania militia as follows:

From in September, 1777, four months in Captain John Miller's company, Colonel Rankin's regiment; in 1782, two months in Captain Peter Ford's company, guarding prisoners, taken when Cornwallis surrendered.

He was allowed pension on his application executed August 23, 1833, then a resident of York County, Pennsylvania, where he had always lived.

Charles Waltamyer was seventy-two years of age in 1833 and was then living a near neighbor to the soldier, David Waltamyer, no relationship stated.

There is no reference to wife or children.

Do you have a record of John Purnell, an American sailor in the Revolution, who died at York, Pennsylvania, May 22, 1863, at the age of ninety-eight? He served, first as a cabin boy with Commodore Paul Jones. His name is sometimes written Purnell or Purnell.

Samuel Martheimer, or Markhamer, a dispatch bearer carrying messages from Gen. Meade was accidentally killed, June 29, 1863, while on his way on horseback to Glen Rock, Pennsylvania, four miles north of Baltimore. He is said to have lived in Western New York, and his father took the boy home for burial three months after the fatal accident, of his son. Do you have the name Martheimer, mother or father, as having drawn a pension? The messages which he had on his person are found in Vol. 27, Part 1, War of the Rebellion Series.

Sir:

In response to your letter of the twenty-sixth ultimo, I have to advise you, that a careful search of the records of this Bureau fails to show claims for pension on file, on account of the services of John Purnell, Pennell, or Punnell in the War of the Revolution, of Samuel Markheimer, or Markhamer in the Civil War, and of Philip Waltmeyer at any time between 1775 and 1846. All spellings of the name searched.

You are requested to furnish any data in your possession relative to the alleged pension of said Philip Waltmeyer.

For the date of death of the only David Waltanyer, (a soldier of the Revolution) found on the pension roll prior to 1846, you should apply to the Pension Section, Civil Division, General Accounting Office, 1800 E. St. N. W. Washington, D. C. citing all of the following data; David Waltanyer, Ctf. 25875, issued January 17, 1834, rate \$20 per annum, commenced March 4, 1831, Act June 7, 1833, Pennsylvania Agency.

Please find enclosed, a copy of the last report of the Commissioner of Pensions, which will furnish the data desired by you relative to soldiers and widows of the Civil War.

The last pensioned survivor of the War of 1812, was Hiram Creak, he died May 13, 1905.
