On the 28th day of ~~November~~

Do one thousand eight hundred & thirty three personally
appeared in open Court before The Honorable Thomas
Burriss Esquire and his associates Judges of the
Court of Common Pleas of the said County of Chester and
State of Pennsylvania, now in person Philip Broadly
a resident of Haines Township Chester County aforesaid aged
seventy years who being duly sworn ~~and sworn~~ and
according to law doth on his solemn oath make the following
declarations in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress
passed the seventh day of June, in the year AD one thousand
Eight hundred and thirty five

That he the said Philip Broadly
entered the service of the United States, under the following
named officers & served as herein stated. That in the month of
AD 1790
May, at ~~and~~ as he can recollect - he at that time resided
in the town of York, York County, State of Pennsylvania - in
the service of the United States, as a militiaman under
the command of Captain John Bowman and assisted in
evacuating English prisoners from the town of York to the
town of Reading in Berks County, State of Pennsylvania. They
were engaged in this service about ten days - in the
month of August of the same year - AD one thousand eight
hundred and eighty said Philip Broadly as a militiaman -
under the command of Captain John Albertson, Lieutenant
John Albertson, and Martin Amersilla of Union County
(who is still alive) Corporal - in which three months said
company were a great part of the time engaged on
fatigue duty. To dig ditches, make pallisades &c for
the safe keeping of said prisoners - After the
expiration of said three months - fully revived out - A
second draft of militia was made, and said
Philip Broadly served three months more as a substitute
for Daniel Spunkel of York County aforesaid in
guarding prisoners at or near the town of York aforesaid
said Philip Broadly was entitled to draw pay for the
said months, but has never received any. He was directed

to the Paymaster in the town of York aforesaid, named
Eichelberger, who said he had received no money, & there
were regular troops in company with the militia during
the last tour, but he does not recollect the names of any
of them. He did not receive any discharge, but
after the expiration of the second tour of duty,
in guarding the prisoners he was permitted to leave
the army, the time for which he was drafted having
expired. He then went to live in York town, York
County as aforesaid, where he lived about six years,
from York he removed to Lancaster County where
he resided in Lancaster County about forty years, &
thence he came to Centre County where he has resided
three years on the eighth day of September last, & where
he now resides. And the said Philip Hershberger
declared healy & relinquish every claim whatever, to
any provision or annuity except the present, and declared
that his name is not on the pension roll of the army
of any state.

Questions by the Court.

- 1st When & in what year were you born?
Ans. In Earl Township, Lancaster County, State
Pennsylvania on the ninth day of May A.D.
1791 one thousand seven hundred & eighty one
- Qnd Have you any record of you regard of do where you
I have a Dauphiné at home with my age
on it
- Qrd When were you living at the time you were
called into service, & where have you lived since
the war and where do you now live?
Ans. I was living in the town of York, York County, State of
Pennsylvania. After the war I resided in York, & came
from York I removed to Lancaster County where I lived
about forty years - from Lancaster County I moved to
Township Centre County where I now reside.
- Qth How were you called into service, were you drafted, did
you volunteer or were you a substitute of a substitute
who were you a substitute for
Ans. In the first tour of ten days in evacuating the prisoners
from York to Reading, I was called out of bed before day
and "peped" to you the second tour on the first three
months, that served in guarding the prisoners at York I
was drafted - The third tour on the second three months
that I was at York I served as a substitute for David
Speckel of York County, who was drafted.

5. State the names of the Regular officers who were with the troops with you, such continental & Militia regiments as you can recollect & the general circumstances of your service

Ans. I do not remember the names of any of the regular officers, or soldiers. I served two days in guarding & escorting prisoners from York to Reading - I was drafted & served three months in guarding the English prisoners at a near York - I then served an additional three months as a substitute for Daniel Spental -

6th Did you ever receive a discharge & where is it
Ans. I never rec^d. a discharge when the term of three months, for which I was drafted had expired I was permitted to leave the army without a discharge

7th State the names of persons residing in your present neighborhood, who can certify as to your character for honesty, and their belief of your services as a soldier of the Revolution
