State of Pennsylvania
Beaver County Esq.

On the Eleventh day of September
Eighteen hundred and forty, personally appears before whom hereinbefore Esq.
Presiding judge - & Mrs. Ann Miller, a widow, residing associate
judge of the "Court of Common Pleas" of said County in Open
Court, Esq. Miller, a widow of the County of Beaver of Pennsylvania,
aged seventy years - & who being poor, and worn, accom-
panying her child with her date, now in full age, application
is made to said court on her date, now in full age, application
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of
Congress, passed Aug 7. 1833, entitled "an act granting a yearly
pension to certain widow."

That she is the widow of Henry Miller who was
a private soldier in the War of the Revolution.

That he was drafted in the military (as she was informed, & believe according to the best of her recollection) in York County
in the State of Pennsylvania - (But the day - month - or year she
does not now recollect) under Capt. Billig -

That they marched from York - (a town commonly called
"Little York") in Oct^ober of 1776, remaining in the camp until Jan
from Maryland - The term of service she does not recollect - with
time of his discharge. - But thinks the term of service about 6 months.

That in consideration of the service of her said husband
she made application (according to the best of her recollection) some-
time in the year eighteen hundred, & thirty five - be-
fore the judges of the "Court of Common Pleas" i.e. for said
County of Beaver, for the benefit of the act of 1833 - was won-
der placed upon the pension list - & entitled to receive twenty dollars
per annum during his natural life.

She further declares that she was married
to the said Henry Miller on the eighth day of April
in the year seventeen hundred and eighty eight (1788) at the town
of Little York" named.

That her husband, the aforesd Henry Miller,
died on the 3^d September eighteen hundred, & thirty seven (1837)

That she was not married to him prior
to his leaving the service - But the marriage took place
at the time above stated - previous to the first of January

seventeen hundred, & ninety four (1794) -
That they had two children - a son & a daughter
when in fifty one years of age - being born in the year seventeen
hundred & eighty nine (1789) -
That she has no more evidence of the man-
sions - nor any record evidence of the ages of the children - ex-
cepting of the ages of two, which is herewith forwarded to
the Department - being a copy taken from the old family
"Common Prayer Book" as will appear by the initials of
Elizabeth Miller that accompanies this application.




On this the third day of December
A. D. eighteen hundred and thirty three personally appeared
in open court before John Bridgeman President of
Thos. Henry and Joseph Beauford Attorneys at law
of the said Court of Common Pleas of Beaver County, now
holder for said County, Henry Miller, a resident of Hopk-
ville Township and County aforesaid, and State aforesaid
aged about seventy six years who being duly sworn de-
claring to have given his solemn oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of
congress passed 7th June 1832. That he entered the ser-
vice of the United States under the following name,
officers and served as herein after stated. That in the
years ~~sixty~~ prior to a seventy six he was drafted in the
Pennsylvania Militia from York County Pennsylvania
for a term of ~~one~~ months under Captain Treat his
Christian name he believes was Peter - does not re-
collect the names of any of the other officers of his company
he was drafted and served as a private - Christian名字
Nelson Kridger, Conrad Goyer and John Rennert
were privates belonging to the same company whose
names he recollects - He belonged to the regiment
commanded by Colonel Superintendent and recollect the names
of any other officers of the regiment or company to which
he belongs than those he has named - after he was drafted
he was marched from York County aforesaid through
Lancaster Pennsylvania to Philadelphia where
the regiment remained a few days to rest. From
Philadelphia they were marched to Montgomery in

New Jersey over about two weeks there were in
number of the troops there at that time besides the
regiment to which he belonged - General Washington
commanded the troops there at that time. There
was he believes six or seven thousand men laying
there at that time of the American Army. This
was about Harvest time - The British were then
laying on the opposite side of the river (by the
accident) the residents of ~~one~~ Treats company
having killed one of the British Guards upon the
opposite side with a kind of large Rifle gun
made apparently for that purpose carrying
about a one quarter ball - he saw the gun
when he fell - he recollects that the gun belongs
to Treats company - They were afterwards ordered
and prepared for using it by the officers - never
saw the gun afterwards - staid at Montgomery two
or three weeks. - From Montgomery he with the Army
were marched back to the Woods a distance
three or four miles and there encamped. This
movement he believes was occasioned by the
scarcity of wood at Montgomery - The Army remain
at this place until his turn was out he
became sick there as was part in a Hospital
or Meeting house which was used as much by the
camp continued with several weeks as unable
to do duty - It was very sickly the Hospital was
full about 35 of six or seven soldiers die in
it every day - after he was able to walk which
was ~~at~~ the expiration of his term of service

He was discharged by an Christian forty one of the
privates of the company to which he belonged a time
near to his already mentioned return home
to York County together. Forty had also been
sixty - they were weak and out of money and
could not travel more than eight or ten miles
a day - Captain Treut gave him his discharge
which he has lost - He knows that all are dead that
were with him at that time - He has not heard of
any of them for many years - After the Captain
of Lord Cornwallis ~~and~~ was in his Army at York
General Washington he was again drafted
to the Pennsylvania Militia from York County
Pennsylvania under Captain George Strong and
was out two months - They marched from York
County to a place about four miles below York
and were engaged in guarding some of the prisoners
taken at York Town - a man by name of
Springfield was sent out of the company the
names of the other officers he does not recollect
- There were no other troops than but long to
guard the prisoners at that place - after the two
months were out they were march home about
fifteen prisoners in the Lancaster Rail Rd.
were put under the guard whom they
conveyed to York County jail and the
company was there discharged - He was

discharged with the rest but has lost his discharge
Captain Long gave him his discharge - He was
a private in Long's company as far as such when
he was out - He resided each time he was drafted
in York County aforesaid - He was not in any
battle - seen some regular troops at Canby
at the encampment in the neighborhood but
does not recollect how many or who were the
officers - He recollects that there were three
privates in Capt Long's company off the name
of Green who were brothers or residents at
that time in York County - He lived in York
County when called into service - Was soon
upon the Blue Mountains in Pennsylvania
- after the revolution he removed with his
family from York County to Redstone in
Fayette County, Pennsylvania - lived about
two years at Redstone - from thence he
removed to Pigeon Creek in Washington
County, Pennsylvania and lived there about
four years - From thence he moved to the mouth
of Little Otter Creek in Allegheny County, ~~Penns~~
and live there fourteen years - From thence
he moved to the place of his present residence
in Beaver County, Hopewell Township, where he
has resided ever since - He does not

In consequence of his old age and consequent
loss of memory recollect certainly the year in
which he was born but believes it was in or
about the year 1755 - He has no record of his
age - He hereby relinquishes any claim whatever
to a pension or annuity except the
present, and he desires that his name is
not on the pension roll of any agency of any
State, as that John Minkle, Minkle,
Reeves, Archibald Stewart, Munro, Ross,
Charles Baker, David Baker, Chris
Graham, Stephen Phillips, John Wilson,
William McDonald, Otto Shouse, James
Reed, William Young, Thomas Campbell
& John Brown are his neighbors at
present and can testify to his good
character as to veracity and that his
claim of his services as a soldier of the revolution
is well founded and unobjectionable. ^{his} Henry H. Miller




