On the Eleventh day of September
Eighteen hundred & thirty seven before Charles H. Smith, Esq.
Judge of the Court of Common Pleas of said County, in open
Court, were present, in presence of the County of Beaver of record,
aged thirty years - who being first duly sworn, accord-
ing to the oath on her oath, made the following declaration,
in order to obtain the benefit of the provision made by the Act of
Congress, passed July 7, 1838, entitled "an act granting help &
pensions to certain widows" -

That she is the widow of Henry Miller who was
a private soldier in the War of the Revolution -

That he was drafted in the militia (and she is in-
formed, & believes according to the best of her recollection) in York County
in the State of Pennsylvania - (But the day - month - or year she
does not know or recollect) - was Capt. Miller -

That they marched from York - (a town commonly called
"Little York") in the County of York, sometime in the year, not far
from March - She does not recollect the day - month - or the
time of his discharge - but thinks the term of service about 6 months -

That in consideration of the service of her said husband
he made application (according to the best of her recollection) some-
time in the year Eighteen hundred & thirty three, or thirty four - be-
fore the judges of the "Court of Common Pleas" in & for said
County of Beaver, for the benefit of the act of 1838 - and was
placed upon the pension list, & entitled to receive twenty dollars
per annum during his natural life -

She further declares that she was married
to the said Henry Miller on the Eighth day of April
in the year aforesaid hundred & Eighty Eight (1788) at the town
of "Little York" aforesaid -

That her husband, the aforesaid Henry Miller,
died on the 3^d of September, Eighteen hundred & thirty seven (1837)

That she was not married to him before
to his leaving the service - But the marriage took place
at the time aforesaid - previous to the first of January

eighteen hundred & thirty seven (1794) -

That they had two children the oldest of
whom is fifty one years of age - being born in the year aforesaid
hundred & Eighty nine (1789) -

That she has no near evidence of the mar-
riage - nor any near witness of the age of the children - ex-
cepting, of the age of two, which is likewise forwarded to
the Department being a leap taken from the old family
"Common Prayer Book" - as will appear by the evidence of
Elizabeth Miller her accomplice in this application -

A. D. eight teen hundred and thirty three personally appeared
the open Court before John Meidner Esq. President and
Thomas Henry and Joseph Kemphill associates Judges
of the said Court of Common Pleas of Beaver County, now
holders for said County, Henry Miller a resident of Hope
-well Township and County aforesaid, and that aforesaid
aged about seventy six years who being duly sworn did
depose to have with on his solemn oath make the following
declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of
Congress passed 7th June 1832. That he entered the ser-
vice of the United States under the following named
officers and served as hereinafter stated. That in the
year seventy six or seventy six he was drafted in the
Pennsylvania Militia from York County Pennsylvania
for a term of ~~one~~ months under Captain Treat his
Christian name he believes was Peter - does not re-
collect the names of any of the other officers of his company
he was drafted and served as a private - Christian Smith
Nelson Kridinger, Conrad Goyer and John Krummholz
were privates belonging to the same company whose
names he recollects - He belonged to the Regiment
commanded by Colonel Swope - don't recollect the names
of any other officers of the Regiment or company to which
he belonged than those he has named - after he was drafted
he was marched from York County aforesaid through
Lancaster Pennsylvania to Philadelphia when
the Regiment remained a few days to rest. From
Philadelphia they were marched to Annapolis in

New Jersey were about two weeks there - then were
number of the troops there at that time besides the
Regiment to which he belonged - General Washington
commanded the troops there at that time - there
was he believes six or seven thousand men lay
there at that time of the American Army - This
was about Harvest time - The British were then
laying on the opposite side of the river (by the
Hagerstown) He recollects of one of Treats company
having killed one of the British guards upon the
opposite side with a kind of large Rifle gun
made apparently for that purpose carrying
about a one ounce ball - he saw the guard
when he fell - he recollects that the gun belong
to Treats company - They were afterwards ordered
and prevented from using it by the officers - never
saw the gun afterwards - Staid at Annapolis
or three weeks - From Annapolis he with the Army
were marched back to the Woods a distance
three or four miles and there encamped - This
movement he believes was occasioned by the
scarcity of wood at Annapolis - The Army remained
at this place until his term was out he
became sick there and was put in a Hospital
a meeting house which was used as such by the
camp continued sick several weeks and unable
to do duty - It was very sickly the Hospital was
full of patients of six or seven soldiers died in
it every day - after he was able to walk which
was ~~at~~ the expiration of his term of service

he was discharged he as Christian Litz, one of the
Officers of the company to which he belonged a while
before he has already mentioned returned home
to York County together - Litz had also been
sick - they were weak and out of money and
could not travel more than eight or ten miles
a day - Captain Treat gave him his discharge
which he has lost - He believes that all are dead that
were with him at that time - He has not heard of
any of them for many years - after the capture
of Lord Cornwallis ~~and~~ and his Army at York
by General Washington he was again drafted
in the Pennsylvania Militia from York County
Pennsylvania under Captain George Strong and
was out two months - They marched from York
County to a place about four miles below York
and were engaged in guarding some of the prisoners
taken at York Town - a man by name of
Springle was Lieutenant of the company the
names of the other officers he does not recollect
- There were no other troops there but Long's
guard to the prisoners at that place - after the two
months were out they were marched home to
York County - on their march home about
fifteen prisoners in the Lancaster Rail Pa-
were put under their guard whom they
conveyed to York County Jail and the
company was then discharged - He was

discharged with the rest but has lost his discharge
Captain Long gave him his discharge - He was
a private in Long's company as soon as such while
he was out - He resided each time he was drafted
in York County aforesaid - He was out in any
battle - seen some regular troops at Cambridge
at the encampment in the neighborhood but
does not recollect how many or who were the
officers - He recollects that there were three
privates in Capt Long's company of the name
of Green who were brothers & residents at
that time in York County - He lived in York
County when called into service - Was taken
upon the Blue Mountains in Pennsylvania
- after the resolution he was made with his
family from York County to Red Stone in
Fayette County, Pennsylvania - lived about
two years at Red Stone - from thence he
removed to Big Horn Creek in Washington
County, Pennsylvania and lived there about
four years - from thence he moved to the mouth
of Little Peters Creek in Allegheny County, ^{Pennsylvania} ~~Washington~~
and lived there fourteen years - from thence
he moved to the place of his present residence
in Meigs County, Hopewell Township, where he
has resided ever since - He does not

In consequence of his old age and consequent
loss of memory recollect certainly the year in
which he was born but believes it was in or
about the year 1755. He has no record of his
age - He freely relinquishes any claim what-
-ever to a pension or annuity except the
present, and he declares that his name is
not on the pension roll of any agency of any
State, and that John Ninkler, William
Stewart, Archibald Stewart, William Ross,
Charles Baker, Daniel Baker, John
Graham, Stephen Phillips, John Wilson,
William de la Bona, Peter Shouse, James
Reed, William Irving, Thomas Campbell
& John Brook are his neighbors at
present and can testify to his good
character as to veracity and that he is
of his services as a soldier of the revolution.

In open Court on today a year ago appeared James Williamson Stewart and John Hinckle citizens of Treason County as neighbors of Henry Miller, the applicant (Onancock, Virginia) who being duly sworn according to law do upon their solemn oath certify that we are well acquainted with the Henry Miller who has subscribed down to the foregoing declaration that we believe him to be seventy six years of

age - that he is reputed and believed in the neighborhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the revolution and that we concur in that opinion - and that there is no Clergyman living in this neighborhood a convenient theater - shown as required in open Court this 3rd day of December 1843.

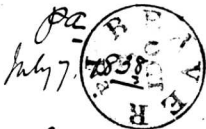

The deposition of Elizabeth Miller shows that the leg. accompanying, was taken from the original books (or page books) belonging to the family - & kept by them &c. - & that Ben Miller the applicant is still unmarried.

The depositions of Mary Miller is to the same effect.

The depositions of John Miller shows that Ben Miller & his wife were together of Henry Miller, & Ben Miller - & his application for a pension, as widow of Ben Miller &c. -

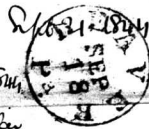


