On the 17th day of August 1832 persons
by Opponent in open court before the Judge of the Court
of Common Pleas for the County of Lytle State of Pennsylvania
brought now setting Jacob Flenney age about seven years
the ninth day of June last, who being first duly sworn
affoars he doth make the following declaration in order
to obtain the benefits of the act of Congress passed the 7th
day of June 1832.

That he entered the service of the United States under
the following names Officers, General or Union states.
That he was born in York county Pennsylvania, but
on the ninth day of June 1775 he went raised in
Lancaster county Pa. That on the fourth day of
June 1778 he entered the service as a volunteer under
the command of Captain Clauter for the term of
six months. That this company was a volunteer
company of Flying Camps. That he was attached
to Col Cunningham's Regiment of Regular Troops.
That he marched with the company from Lancaster
to Philadelphia, from thence by Water to Trenton
New Jersey. from thence to Princeton, from thence to
Brentwood, from thence to Anthony, from thence to
Cleobothtown & from thence to Newark. That
they then crossed the North river into New York
and was taken to Long Island. That on the 17th day
of August 1778 he was engaged in the Battle of
Total Bush under the command of Genl Sullivan.
That Genl Putnam was also there. That after
the battle he was marched up the East river about
forty miles to a place called Bellows Mills, &
stationed there a short time & from thence taken
to the White plains & from thence back to

Philadelphia where his term of service expired. That
he then left the service having served six months
and returned home in December 1778. That he
received no written discharge. That he has no
documentary evidence of his service - no one he
knows of any persons at present by whom he can
establish them, that that - the Revd Thornton
Flenney & David Strickler will certify as to his
character. That he resides at the time he entered
the service in Lancaster county pa. That he returned
there & continued to reside there for some time
after. That he then removed to the Western Con-
Ntry & settled in Lytle County where he still
resides. That he is about seven years of age. I have a record
of his age otherwise in his file.

No body relinquishes any claim to any other
opinion except the present, is that his name was
not on the Payroll Roll of any army of any state
that he has no documentary evidence or any person
to prove his service.

APPLICATION FOR A TRANSFER.

The State of Indiana

On this Twenty ninth day of September AD 1837,
before me, the subscriber, a Justice of the Peace for the said County of
Wayne personally appeared Jacob Forney
who, on his oath, declares that he is the same
person who formerly belonged to the Company commanded by Captain
Edw. C. Steves — in the Regiment commanded by Colonel
Cunningham — in the service of the United States; that
his name was placed on the pension roll of the State of Pennsylvania
from whence he has lately removed; that he now resides in the State (District
of Indiana) of Indiana
where he intends to
remain, and wishes his pension to be there payable, in future. The follow-
are his reasons for removing from Pennsylvania
to Indiana because his children and relations
had most of them previously removed and he
wishes to be with or near to them.

The oath to be taken before a duly qualified Magistrate, whose official character and signature must be certified by the proper officer under his seal or office. The County Clerk, Secretary of State, or some other officer, must certify, under his seal or office, that the officer who administered the oath is a Justice of the Peace, Judge, Mayor, Alderman, or Notary Public, as the case may be, and that the signature purporting to be his is genuine.

The oath must be supported by the testimony of some respectable person, as to the pensioner's identity. He must swear that the person who has made the pension is a citizen of the United States. The Magistrate must certify that the person is a citizen of the United States, and the affidavit must also be authenticated in the manner above directed. In every case where the Clerk of the Court, or other certifying officer, has no public seal or office, the certificate of a member of Congress, proving the official character and signature of the certifying officer, should be sent with the papers.

Mode of authenticating papers.—In every instance where the certificate of the certifying officers who authen-
ticate the paper is not written on the same sheet which contains the affidavit, or other paper authenticated, the certifi-
cate must be attached thereto by a piece of tape or small ribbon, the ends of which must pass under the seal of office of
the certifying officer so as to prevent any paper from being improperly attached to the certificate.
