State of Pennsylvania

On this eighth day of August eighteen hundred and thirty two personally appeared in open court before Walter Franklin Esq. President of the courts of common pleas in and for the County of York and State of Pennsylvania now sitting Henry Baumgardner a citizen of Maryland, and resident in Frederick County near the Pennsylvania line, and not far from Hanover in the County of York, aged seventy four years, who being duly sworn according to law doth depose, and upon his solemn oath makes the following declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed the sixteenth day of June eighteen hundred and thirty two, That he was born in Frederick County Maryland in seventeen hundred and fifty eight, but has no record of his age that he lived with Geo. Kitzmiller in that part of York County now Adams County Penna. in seventeen hundred and seventy six; when the said George Kitzmiller was drafted as a Militia Man in the company of Capt. Thomas Fisher near Littleton in said County, which said company was organized in or near Hanover and marched thro. Lancaster Philad. Trenton N. J. to Annapolis, where it remained untill the end of two months. That the said Henry Baumgardner went in said company as a substitute for George Kitzmiller, and served the whole of the term of duty. That at the end of the two months he enlisted in the company of Capt. Nicholas Bittinger in the Flying Camp and served six months the term for which he enlisted. That Capt. Bittinger was taken prisoner at Fort Washington that he with others escaped to Fort Mifflin; that he marched with the detachment of the Army from Fort Lee through New Jersey to Trenton, crossed the Delaware, and at the end of his term of six months was discharged, but has lost the written discharge which he received from Col. M^r Allister. That in the following year he served a term of duty of two months in guarding the prisoners taken with Burgoyne, but does not remember the names of the officers under whom he served. That he is well known in Hanover York County Penna. near where he resides by the Hon. John D. Hinkle a Judge of this court, and by Henry Felty who was a member of Capt. Bittinger's company with him in the Revolution, and also by Jacob Baumgardner who also can testify to the service of this deponent. The said Henry Baumgardner hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the pension list or roll of the Agency of any State.

The evidence in support of your claim, under the act of June 7, 1832, has been examined, and the papers are herewith returned. The following is a statement of your case in a tabular form. sylvania to Fredericktown, Maryland, in 1706 to Northumberland County, Pennsylvania, in 1763 moved near Havre de Grace, Maryland, in 1816 moved "to the neighborhood of the District of Columbia" and in 1818 moved to the "Vineyard" Washington County, District of Columbia. Where he was living when he was allowed pension pension on his application executed, November 1, 1833.

Reference was made in 1833 to brothers and sisters of the soldier, John Adlum, who were then living in Lycoming County, Pennsylvania, *names not stated*

The soldier died March 1, 1833, leaving a widow; her name is not stated, and there is no reference to children.

Henry Baumgartner-9.22033

The record furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, D. 22033, based upon the service of Henry Baumgartner in the Revolutionary War.

Henry Baumgartner was born in the year 1780 in Frederick County, Maryland, names of his parents not given.

While residing, with George Mitchell, in West

County (that part later Adams County), Pennsylvania, Henry Baumgartner served in 1773 as a substitute for said George Kitzmiller, two months in Captain Thomas Fisher's Pennsylvania company. At the expiration of that service, he enlisted and served six months as a private in Captain Nicholas Bittinger's company, Colonel McAllister's regiment of the Flying Camp. The following year he served two months guarding prisoners taken "with Burgoyne", names of officers not given.

The soldier, Henry Baumgartner, was allowed pension on his application executed, August 8, 1833, at which time he was a resident of Frederick County, Maryland, near the Pennsylvania line, about twenty-five miles from York, Pennsylvania. His application was executed in said York, as it was nearer than the county seat of Frederick County, Maryland.

There is no reference to wife or children.

Jacob Baumgartner was living in 1833 near Hanover, York County, Pennsylvania; his relationship to the soldier, Henry Baumgartner, is not shown.
