of York County, Pa. On this eleventh day of September, 1821
Personally appeared in open Court, to wit the Court of Common
pleas of said county the same being a Court of record inasmuch as it
proceeds according to the course of the common law with approp-
riation unlimited in point of amount, and keeps a record of
proceedings) Jacob Moyer aged 70 years who being first duly
sworn according to law, doth on his oath make the following dis-
claration in order to obtain the provision made by the acts of con-
gress of the 18th of March 1818 and the 1st of May 1820, that he the
said Jacob Moyer served in the revolutionary war as follows in Col
Waynes regiment in the Pennsylvania line in the company com-
manded by Capt James Taylor from February 1776 until the end
of one year, was enlisted in York County Pennsylvania; during which
time he faithfully served his country as a private soldier - was discharged
at Chester in 1777 - that the date of his original application for a
pension is July 31st 1818, and the number of his pension certificate
is 13,923 - and I do solemnly swear that I was a resident citizen
of the United States on the 15th of March 1818; and that I have not since
that time by gift, sale, or in any manner disposed of my property, or
any part thereof with intent thereby to diminish it as to being
myself within the provisions of the act of Congress entitled "an act
to provide for certain persons engaged in the land and naval services
of the United States, in the revolutionary war," passed on the 18th day
of March 1818; and that I have not nor has any person in trust for
me, any property, or securities, contracts or debts due to me; nor
have I any income other than what is contained in the schedule
hereto annexed, and by me subscribed; viz. real property more or
less - that by a schedule forwarded to the Honourable the Secretary of
War, taken on the 7th day of August 1820, and sworn to on the same day
he had noted that, in consideration of 100 acres of poor land by deed
conveyed to his son, his son entered into a written agreement to furnish
him with victuals and clothing for and during his natural life,
that previous to the conveyance to his son he had executed a mortgage
of the same land to George Steerman, and that since the conveyance
to his son, and since the date of schedule before forwarded to the
department, the property before mentioned has been used and sold by
virtue of the same mortgage; which said sale leaves him entirely
destitute of any means of subsistence - I have no friends or relatives
to contribute to my support, and can work but little
