State of Pennsylvania
 County of York

On this 7th day of January A.D. 1833 Personally
 appeared before me the undersigned one of the Judges of the Court
 of Common Pleas in and for the said County of York in the State
 of Pennsylvania John Staab age 74 years who being first duly
 sworn according to law in order to obtain the benefit of an Act of
 Congress passed June 9th 1832

1 That about the 1st of September 1781 I volunteered to serve
 in Captain Saterly's Company as a Substitute for Jacob
 Rothrock for two months at Camp Security in York County
 to guard watch & keep secure the prisoners taken with Genl. Cornwallis
 and duly served out the time for which I engaged and was then discharged
 by Capt. Saterly at Camp Security in the County of York
 2 And that he was drafted about the middle of the month of April 1782
 to serve in Captain Hager's Company for two months to serve at
 Camp Security to guard the Prisoners and served two months
 and was honorably discharged at Camp Security in
 County of York by Capt. [Signature] in June 1782
 3 That he volunteered to serve in Captain Ford's
 Company to guard the British prisoners
 taken with Genl. Cornwallis in the year 1782
 and served two months the time he volunteered
 and was honorably discharged at Camp Security in the
 month of November 1782
 and that he served by Capt. Ford and that he served
 at least altogether six months in the Army of the
 Revolution and that he has no documentary evidence
 of his service in his possession nor does he know of any
 person living that he can get to prove his service except
 Matthias Stibb whom he relinquish every Claim to
 a pension except the present and declare that my name
 is not on the pension Roll of the Agency of any State or place
 Whatsoever nor did ever apply for a pension or Annuity before
 Sworn to and Subscribed before me this day of [Signature] Staab
 Geo. Barnitz

Answer I was born in Berks County Pa on the year 1789

Question by Judge 2 Have you any recd of your age or so where is it
Answer I have a Record of my age in my paper book

Question by Judge 3 Where were you living when called to be served
Where have you lived since the Revolutionary war
and where do you now live
Answer I lived in ^{York} County when called into service
and have lived here ever since the Revolutionary War
and now live in York County

Question by Judge 4 How were you called into service and you drafted
did you volunteer or were you a substitute for whom
Answer I was a substitute for the first time for
Jacob Kethbrock and for two months the second time for
the third time I was also drafted and
served at York for several months in the
Army of the Revolution

Question by Judge 5 What the names of some of the Regular Officers
who was in the troops where you served such
Continental and Militia Regiments as you
can recollect and the general circumstances
Answer I was not acquainted with many regular Officers
they were called Officers mostly that guarded the British prisoners taken at Red Bank
I was acquainted with Capt Ford Major Austin and many other
Militia Officers

Question by Judge 6 Did you receive a discharge from the service
and if so by whom was it given and what
has become of it
Answer I received three several discharges all of which
I lost on my way to Capt Saterles and on from
Capt Saterles and the last one by Capt
Staat

Question by the Judge 7 What the names of several soldiers you were in company
with
Answer I was in company with several soldiers
I recollect the names of Charles K. Knapp and the latter of
John Staat
