In this eighth day of Sep-
tember Anno Domini one thousand eight
hundred and thirty five personally appeared
before me (the President of the Court of Common
Pleas of the municipal judicial District of Pottsville
in now holding a Court of Sessions on this

Everhart a resident of West Manchester Town-
ship York County and State of Pennsylvania who
being first duly sworn — according
to law doth in his said oath — make
the following declaration to wit to wit

that he was born in the Township in which
he now resides on the — day of the month of January
one thousand seven hundred and 8th of 1772
— that he is now in the seventy eighth year
of his age. — that in July 1776 the day he came

remember he entered the service of his country
as a substitute for his father Leonard Everhart
in a company of Militia of in Captain
Michael Sengler was captain and Philip Hoffman
one of the Lieutenants, attached to the Regi-
ment commanded by Col — Sharp, and
which regiment was attached to the Brigade
of General James Ewing, from York & Schuyl-
kill to Philadelphia and encamped there a
few days from thence we proceeded to Fran-
con, Lancaster, Dauphin, and encamped
at Elizabethtown, that after remaining there
about fifty days and while on guard Captain
Sengler was ordered to march to
Long Island — at the time of the Battle of Long
Island I was standing guard and heard
the firing. Captain Sengler and his men
were taken prisoner this was in near as far
recalled on the 27 of August — in about a
month after that Captain Sengler
returned to his people or was exchanged
I can't tell which, I moved from camp in

July of the year 1776 to later in December say about
 the middle of November of the same year. I can then certify
 my discharge was in writing but I cannot remember the date or it
 is lost. In the year 1777. He served as a substitute for my
 father for the term of three months from sometime in ~~the month of~~
~~the month of~~ in January to guard the British prisoners at ~~the~~
 near York County Prison and marched to Reading Town as
 a guard of some of them who were ordered to ~~the~~
 George Washington's command. Said company Captain ~~James~~
 who is a prisoner of the United States, will certify to the truth
 of the above statement. I ~~do~~ Lieutenant ~~has~~ relinquish every
 claim whatever to compensation or annuity except the present
 and desire that my name is not on the pension roll of any
 agency in any state.

Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your request for the Revolutionary War record of George Eisenhart of York County, Pennsylvania.

The data furnished herein were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, R. 3375, based upon the service of George Eisenhart during the War of the Revolution.

George Eisenhart was born in the year 1757 in Manchester Township, York County, Pennsylvania. He was the son of Conrad Eisenhart, name of his mother not given.

He applied for pension, September 8, 1835, then a resident of Manchester Township, Pennsylvania, and alleged that he enlisted sometime in July, 1776, served as a substitute for his father, in Captain Michael Snyder's company, Colonel Sarge's Pennsylvania regiment, until about the middle of November, 1776, and that he served in the fall of 1777, three months in Captain George Geishelman's company and guarded prisoners in York County; this service was, also, as substitute for his father.

The claim was not allowed as proof of six months' service as required by the pension law was not furnished. There is no reference to wife and children.

Madam;

I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim, R. 3275, it appears that George, son of Conrad Eisenhart, was born in 1757 in West Manchester Township, York County, Pennsylvania.

While residing in said West Manchester Township, he alleged that he enlisted in July 1776 and served to November 1776 in Captain Michael Sayer's Company, Colonel Swope's Pennsylvania Regiment, and in the fall of 1777, served three months in Captain George Geishelman's Pennsylvania Company.

He applied for pension September 8, 1835, while living at West Manchester Township, Pennsylvania, but his claim was not allowed, as he failed to furnish specific proof of service as required by the pension laws.
