Dear Sir:

Reference is made to your letter in which you state "on Page 598 of Volume 23 of the Third Series, Pennsylvania Archives appears the name Christian Bran-aman", Mastapplied for pension from Jackson Parish, Louisians, January 29, 1853, then aged seventy-six years.

The War of 1812 records of this office have been searched and no claim for pension found based on the service of Christiam Branaman; similar spellings of the surname were searched. The pension referred to may have been granted by the state from which this soldier served.

The record of Christian Branch, War of the Revolution, has been found. The provide March is furnished herein, as found in pension with U. 16000, based upon his service in that war.

Christian Brangann was born "Christmas", 1758 in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania; the name of his parents are not given.

While residing in Codorus Township, about seven miles from York in Tork County, Pennsylvania, he volunteered July 1, 1776, served a short while in Captain George Deal's company, Colonel Smith's regiment, then in Captain John McDonald's company, Colonel Swope's Pennsylvania Regiment of the Flying Camp, assisted in building Fort Lee, was in the battle of Trenton and

was discharged January 4 or 5, 1777. He emlisted in the fall of 1777, served two months in Captain William White's company, Colonel Rankin's Pennsylvania regiment. He enlisted sometime in August (year not definitely shown), served four months in Captain William Dodd's company under Major William Bailey, guarding British prisoners, taken when Burgoyne surrendered.

The soldier, Christian Braneman, moved about two years after the Revolution to Lincoln County, North Carolina, lived there about twenty years, moved to Madison County, Kentucky, lived there about nine years, moved to Washington County, Indiana, there about nine years and moved to Salt Creek Township, Jackson County, Indiana,

He was allowed pension on his application executed September 6, 1852, then residing in Salt Creek Township, Indiana.

The papers in this claim contain no reference to the family of the soldier.

If you desire information in regard to the last payment of pension, name and address of person paid, and possibly the date of death of this pensioner, you should address the Comptroller General, General Accounting Office, Records Division, Washington, D. C., and cite the following deta:

- II. Did the declarant make the declaration in the county where he resides? 420

- IV. Has the declarant mentioned the period or periods of the war when he served? yes

and the particular rank he held, as the law directs the pension to be paid according to the grade of the pensioner and the length of his service. The use of the phrase about three or four months is too indefinite, and all such qualifying expressions are objectionable.

QUERE XIV. Proof of Service.

In a case where the name of the applicant is not found on the records of the Department, he must prove his service by two credible witnesses, who are required to set forth in their affidavits the time of the claimants entering the service, and the time and manner of his leaving the same, as well as the regiment, company, and line to which be belonged. The magistrate who may 'administer the oaths must certify to the credibility of the witnesses, and the official character and signature of the magistrate must be certified by the proper officer, under his seal of office.

tQUERE XVI. Mode of authenticating papers.

In every instance where the certificate of the certifying officer who authenticated the papers is not written on the same sheet of paper which contains the affidavit, or other paper authenticated, the certificate must be attached thereto by a piece of tape or narrow ribbon, the end of which must pass under the seal of office of the certifying officer, so as to prevent any paper from being improperly attached to the certificate.

- M. Has the applicant obtained the evidence of a clergyman and another respectable citizen as to their belief respecting his age and the general belief in his neighborhood relative to his revolutionary service? Certifical by two cityms
- XII. If the clergyman's affidavit has not been produced, is there any reason assigned for not obtaining it? 770

- XIV. † If the applicant has produced a witness or witnesses as to his service, has the magistrate who administered the oath certified that he, she, or they are persons of credibility? Has the official character and signature of the magistrate been certified by the proper officer under his seal of office?
- XV. Does it appear from any of the papers that the witness was in such a situation, or of such an age, as to have a personal knowledge of the applicant's service?
- XVI. Are the papers authenticated as the regulations direct?
- XVII. Are the seven interrogatories prescribed by the War Department answered satisfactorily? And, if not, which of them is not so answered?

EXPLANATORY NOTES.

QUERE V. In a case where the applicant cannot, by reason of the loss of memory, state precisely how
long he served, he should amend his declaration by making an affidavit in the following words:

"Personally appeared before me, the undersigned, a Justice of the Peace, &c. A. B. who, being days worn, deposeth and saith, that, by reason of old age, and the consequent loss of memory, he cannot swear positively as to the precise length of his service, but according to the best of his recollection he served not less than the periods mentioned below, and in the following grades: For year ______ months and ______ days, I served as a ______ and for afth service I claim a pension."

On Page 598 of Volume 23 of the Third Series. Pennsylvania archives appears the name of Christian Branaman, who applied for a pension from Jackson Parish, Louisiana, in the year 1853(Jan. 29) when he was 76 years of age. The application apparently states that he was a private in the Fennsylvania troops in either the Revolution or the War of 1812-judging from the date, it would have to be the latter war. I have to advise you that from the papers in the Revolutionary War pension claim S. 16060 it appears that Christian Braneman was born December 25, 1757 or 1758 in Montgomery County, Pennsylvania.

While residing in Codorus Township, York County, Penncylvania he enlisted July 1, 1776 as a private in Captain George Deal's Company, Colonel Smith's Pennsylvania Regiment and during that month volunteered in Captain John McDonald's Company, Colonel Swope's Pennsylvania Regiment of the Flying Camp, was in the battle of Trenton and was discharged January 4 or 5, 1777.

He enlisted in the fall of 1777 and served two months as a private in Captain William White's Company, Colonel Rankin's Pennsylvania Regiment.

He enlisted in August 1781 and served four months as a private in Captain William Dodd's Company William Bailey in the Pennsylvania Troops.

He was allowed pension on his application executed

September 6, 1832 while a resident of Salt Creek Town-ship, Jackson County, Indiana.
