Personally appeared before me one of the Justices of the Court of Common Pleas in and for said County George Badley a resident of said County aged 72 years who being first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following declaration in order to take the benefit of an act of Congress passed June 7th 1837

1st That he was drafted in York County about the 1st July 1776 in Captain Longs Company of Militia in Col. Swoopes Battalion for three months in the revolutionary war and marched from York to Lancaster from thence to Philad^a and to Trenton and Brunswick from thence to Comboy and to Newark in the State of New Jersey and duly served out the term for which he was drafted and was Honourably discharged at Newark in the month of October in the year 1776

2^d That in the fall of the year 1782 he was again drafted to serve in Captain Furrys Company in the County of York where he was ordered to guard water and to secure the British prisoners taken with Genl Cornwallis at a place called Camp Security in the County aforesaid and served three months

3^d That he was discharged by Cap Furry about the first of December in the same year

4th That he served altogether at least six months in the Army of the Revolution and I further declare that I have no documentary Evidence in my possession nor do I know of any persons living whose testimony I can produce in my own defence except Philip Wagoner and that I hereby relinquish every Claim whatever to a Pension or Annuity except the present and declare that my name is not on the pension roll of the Agency of any State or place whatever and that I never made an application for a pension until in the present instance

Question by Judge 1 Where and in what year were you born
Answer I was born in York County Pa in the year 1762

Question by the Judge 2 Have you any record of your age if so where is it
Answer I have no Record of my age

Question by Judge 3 Where were you living when called into service
where have you lived since the Revolutionary war and where do you now live
Answer I lived in York County when called into service and have lived in S^c County ever since the Revolution

Question by Judge 4 How were you called into service were you drafted did you volunteer or were you a substitute and if a substitute for whom
Answer I was drafted

Question by Judge 5 State the names of some of the regular Officers who were with the Troops where you served such Continental and regular Regiments as you can recollect and the General Customs of your Service
Answer I was not acquainted with any of the regular Officers but I was acquainted with the Battalion to wit Captain Dull Capt Long and Capt Spence (and Capt Long under whom he served)

Question by Judge 6 Did you ever receive a discharge from the Service and if so by whom was it given and what has become of it
Answer I rec^d two several discharges one signed by Capt Furry and the other by Capt Long both of which I have lost

Question by Judge 7 State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present Neighbourhood and who can testify as to your Character for Probity and their belief of your services as a Soldier of the Revolution
Answer Jacob Lorne Henry Lorne George Wagoner Henry Marcellus all can testify as to my Character and their belief of my services as a Soldier in the Revolution

Clergoman resident in the Borough of York and that
William Sayers - who has signed this same is a resident
in the same place and is a Credible Person and that their Statement
is entitled to Credit. And I further certify that the above
Applicant for pension is not able to attend to make his
his declaration in consequence of bodily infirmities

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Civil War record of Nelson Bailey, of York County, Pennsylvania, who was killed in the battle of Gettysburg, also, Revolutionary War record of George Bailey, of Pennsylvania, who received a pension, March 4, 1834.

There is no claim for pension on file based upon service of the above named Nelson Bailey; it is suggested that you apply to the Adjutant General, War Department, this city, for information in regard to his military service. The record of George Bailey is given herein as found in his claim for pension, S.32835, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War. This is the only George Bailey, of Pennsylvania, found on the Revolutionary War pension records of this office.

George Bailey
S.32835

George Bailey was born in 1762, in York County, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents are not shown.

George Bailey enlisted about July 1, 1776, in York County, Pennsylvania, where he was then residing, and served three months as a private in Captain Long's Company, Colonel Crook's Pennsylvania Regiment. He enlisted in the Fall of 1782, served in Captain Perry's Company under Major Austin in the Pennsylvania Troops and was discharged about December 1, 1782, having served three months.

He was allowed pension on his application awarded January 18, 1834, while residing in York County, Pennsylvania, where he had resided ever since the Revolution.

George Bailey died November 25, 1842, place not shown.
There are no data as to soldier's family.

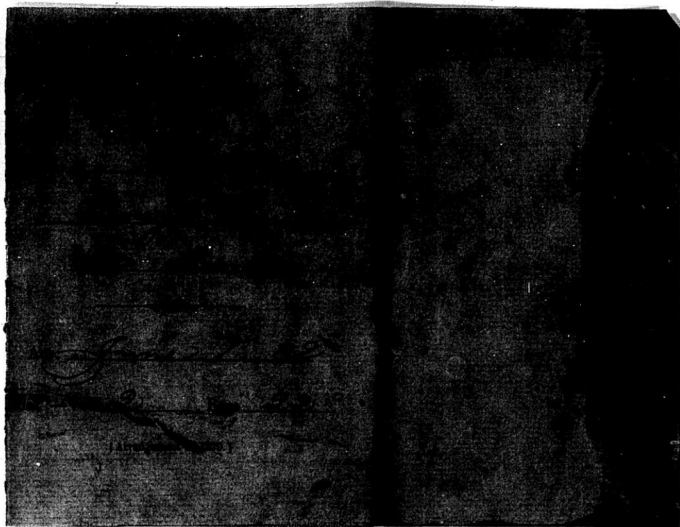
Sir:

Under the act of the 6th of April, 1838, entitled "An Act directing the transfer of money remaining unclaimed by certain Pensioners, and authorizing the payment of the same at the Treasury of the United States," and the third section of the Act of August 23, 1842, extending the time within which pensioners may receive their pensions from the pension agents, *The Adm^r of George Bailey, dec^d.* a Pensioner on the Roll of the Philadelphia, Pa. Agency, at the rate of *Twenty* Dollars and *—* Cents per annum, under the law of the *7th June 1832*, has been paid at this Department, from the *4th of March 1843*, to the *23rd Nov. 1843*.

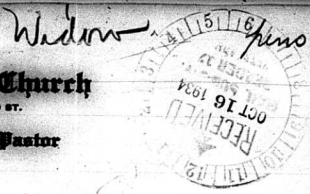
In the Pennsylvania Archives, Third series, Vol. 23, page 544, there is a record of pension received by George Bailey of Old Codorus, March 4, 1834. He was a private in the Penna. militia.

It has been suggested to me that I write you for data which may give us more information about his military service, the dates of his birth and death, and if possible where he was buried. I will appreciate any facts you can furnish concerning this George Bailey.

Then may I also trouble you to give me some information about a Nelson Bailey from York Co., Penna., who served in the Civil War and was killed in the battle of Cold Harbor. This man I learned from a nephew, but he does not know the date of his birth. Possibly your records will show that as well as the exact date of his death, and the place of his burial.

If family records would have been kept more carefully all the information now sought could be easily obtained. As it is I am obliged to call upon your department to help me get what is available from government records.
