County of Beaver }
On this third day of December A.D. 1834 personally appeared
in open Court before John Braden president and Thomas
Henry and Benjamin Adams his associates judges of the Court
of Common Pleas and quarter sessions in and for said County
now sitting Jacob Groscott a resident of South Beaver Township
in said County and State above said aged seventy four years who being
first duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following
Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed
June 7th A.D. 1832

That he entered the Service of the United States as a private Militia man
in the Revolution War a substitute in the place of his brother John
Groscott who was drafted for a term of two months that he entered
the service as stated in the Company of Militia Commanded by Capt =
tain Curtis and served under Colonel Ranken on the first of
October in the year of our Lord 1777 and served a full term of
two months until the first of December 1777 when he received a discharge
from the service from the said Officers that he resided in York
County in Pennsylvania when he entered the service and marched
in the army to near where General Potter was stationed near to
Philadelphia in order to prevent the British who then lay in Philadelphia
from doing mischief in the adjacent Country

That he entered the Service of the United States again as a private
Volunteer on the first of October A.D. 1780 under Captain John
Smith and marched under said Captain Smith to Morristown
near two hundred miles leaving Philadelphia on the right - served
a term of two months and on the first of December of A.D. 1780
he received his discharge from the service from the said Captain Smith
having served no Regiment or higher officers during the said Term

That he entered the service of the United States again as drafted private
Militia man on the first of December A.D. 1781 in the Company Com-
manded by Captain John Wampler being called to guard the British
Prisoners that he marched in the Company of said Captain Wampler
to Camp Security about three miles below Little York built
Stockades to secure the British prisoners there and received his dis-
charge from the service from said Captain Wampler on the first of
December A.D. 1782 having served a full term of two months
making all in the three terms above mentioned 3 1/2 months

That he has no paper that would documentary evidence of his service
but that John Knight who is now his neighbour has been acquainted
with him from their youth long before he entered the service was
a Militia man with him in the service of the United States in the
revolution and knows that he rendered the service above stated

That he hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or
annuity except the present and declares that his name is not on the
pension Roll of the agency of any state. Questions by the Court
Where and in what year were you born Answer in Berwick Township
in York County in Pennsylvania in the year 1760

2nd Have you any record of your age and if so where is it
Answer No I have no written record of my age

3rd Where were you living when called into service where have you lived
since the Revolution War and where do you now live
Answer When Called into service I lived Still in Berwick Township in
York County in Pennsylvania I lived in the same County until I moved
to where I now live in Beaver County in said State thirty three years since
last march

4th How were you called into the service Answer I first served two
months as a substitute in the place of John Groscott the second two months
I volunteered under Captain Smith the third two months later
I was drafted and served under Captain Wampler making six months in all

5th State the names of some of the regular Officers who were with the troops
when you served such Continental and militia Regiments as you can
recall and general circumstances of your service

Answer The first term under Colonel Ranken near General Potter in Capt.
Curtis Company the second under Captain Smith and the third under
Captain Wampler

6th Did you ever receive a discharge from the Service

Answer I always received regular discharges at the end of each Term
but I have lost them all

7th State the names of persons to whom you are known in your present
neighbourhood and who can testify as to your character for veracity
and their belief of your services as a soldier of the Revolution
Answer I could state the names of many of my neighbours who are ac-
quainted with me and John Knight who served in the revolution was
with me and is well acquainted with me I sworn to and subscribed
the day and year above said

I John Knight residing in the County of Beaver and State of Pennsylvania
do hereby certify on my oath that I have been acquainted with Jacob
Groscott who has subscribed and sworn to the foregoing Declaration
since we were small lads in the same neighbourhood was with him
in the service of the United States in the Revolution War that I believe
him to be seventy four years of age and well know that he rendered
the service to the United States as he has stated
I swear to and subscribe the day and year aforesaid John Knight
"same place &c"

I James Miller residing in the County of Beaver and State
of Pennsylvania do hereby certify that I am well acquainted with Jacob
Groscott who has subscribed and sworn to the foregoing Declaration
that I believe him to be seventy four years of age that he is reported to
be buried in the neighbourhood where he resides to have been a soldier of the
revolution and that I concur in that opinion
