Dear Sir:

The data contained herein was obtained from the papers on file in the Revolutionary War claim, S.10583, based upon the military service of Jacob Doudel in that war.

The date and place of birth and the names of the parents of Jacob Doudel (whose name is also written Doudle and Doudell) are not shown.

Jacob Doudel enlisted in York, Pennsylvania, July 1, 1778 and served as drummer in Captain Doudel's Company, Colonel Michael Swope's Battalion of the Flying Camp for six months. He also served at intervals during the war, in the Pennsylvania Militia, under the following officers, Captains Sunderland, Sawyer, Ford, Long and McDonald, and from November 1782 in Captain Ford's Company, under Major Bailey, he guarded prisoners at Camp Security two months.

He was a resident of York County, Pennsylvania, during service and until 1832, when he moved to Ohio, *and* living there until he died September 21, 1837.

In 1845, the only surviving children were Michael, referred to as "General Doudel", George, Mary who married George Klinefelter, and Sarah who married Adam Klinefelter.

The pension due their father was allowed to the children on an application executed November 6, 1847, by son Michael while a resident of York County, Pennsylvania, aged fifty-seven years.

The date of soldier's marriage, and the name of his wife are not stated.



I read your letter and noticed its contents, and in reply have to make the following remarks concerning the statements made in your letter.

First you have stated in your letter to me that the different tours of service performed by my father Jacob Doidge must be proved and the time for which he served during each tour.

I'm ready to that request I refer you again to the declaration and the oath of Philip Hambrance to whom you grant a pension many years ago. It says that he performed the same kind of service that he did and for the same term.

How have his declaration in the pension office, if Philip Hambrance was entitled to a pension so was my father also for the same term.

I've answered to your statement concerning the testimony of Michel Loidner you say his testimony was not admissible because he did not obtain a pension himself.

In reply to that evasion I consider it very dishonorable and unreasonable in the extreme

to make such an excuse as that,

The reason Michel Loidner did not obtain a pension he was under the age of sixteen years a part of the time he served as a Soldier he was a pensioner of Pennsylvania, and as you mean to say that he is not a competent witness to prove the service of others have you not granted hundreds of pensions on the testimony of those who was never in service themselves.

If you are not governed by any law or equity I wish to know if you say that Loidner is guilty of perjury if you swear that I will to know if I will have the matter investigated before a high tribunal than yourself where there is no records or documentary evidence to prove the error of a soldier you have granted pensions on the testimony of ^{one} witness in many cases, so I am informed in this case you have three witnesses all these pensioners of Pennsylvania. I am not a pension agent and am not acquainted with your evasions, but am determined to prosecute this claim eventually. All I want is the balance due me for the service of my father up to the day of his death you have the testimony of three witnesses in this case.
