The State of Ohio, Columbus County. On this fifteenth day of August 1832, personally appeared before me, Clerk of the Court of the County of said County, George P. Dayhoff a resident of Columbus County in said County of Columbus, and state of said age 74 years the 5th November next, who being first duly sworn according to law, that he doth hereby make the following declaration, in order to obtain the benefit of the Act of Congress, passed 7th June 1832, that he entered the service of the United States under the following rank officers, and served in his station, to wit: James born on the 5th day of November 1758 in Hudson Township York County State of Pennsylvania I was called upon in the month of April by James born a call was made for that class, to send into town - I accordingly marched to Little York - I served under the following officers - William born - Major William born - Adjutant - Boag - Commander Henry born - Quartermaster Nelson - The Captain in York County until my term of two months service had expired - I received my discharge from Major born in that town - "Camp security I am satisfied that George born & Dayhoff has served his full term in the Militia Camp of York County Pennsylvania.

The hereby relinquishes any claim whatever of a pension or annuity except the present, and declares that his name is not in the Pension Roll of the Treasury of any State.

Sworn on and subscribed this day and year aforesaid.

In the presence of William born and Peter born residing in the town of Columbus and County of Columbus and State of Ohio being called upon that was and they were present with George P. Dayhoff who has read and subscribed to the above declaration, that he doth hereby

be seventy one year of age next 5th. of November; that he is reputed and believed, in the neighborhood where he lives, to have been a soldier of the Revolution, and that we concur in that opinion.

1st. When and in what year was you born?

Ans. I was born in Cadogan Township, York County, Pennsylvania on the 5th day of November 1761.

2. Have you any record of your age, and if so, when is it?

Answer. I have my age recorded in my family Bible, which I drew off from a Bible belonging to my father.

3. When were you living when called into service, where, and when did you live the Revolutionary way, and when do you now live?

Answer. I was living in Cadogan Township York County, Pennsylvania, at which place I had settled when I came to this state which was on the 14th day of April 1812, and I now live in the town of Columbia Columbia County O.

4. How was you called into service?

Answer. I was drafted for two months.

5. State the names of some of the Regular Officers,

who were with the troops when you served; and such Continental and Militia Regiments as you saw or collected, and the general circumstances of your service - There were no regular officers except one adjutant.

Answer - Captain Wm. Dod, Major Atton, adjutant - Hoag - Commissary Henry Miller and Quartermaster - Miller. I cannot recollect any Continental or Militia Regiments, and the circumstances of my service are such as detailed in my declaration.

6. - See if you can receive an discharge from the said, and if so, by whom was it given and what has become of it?

Answer - I rec'd a discharge from Major Atton, and what has become of it I cannot tell.

7. State the names of some persons to whom you are known in your present neighborhood, and who can testify as to your character or veracity, and the belief as to your being or not being a soldier of the Revolution -

Answer. William Moody, and Peter Bushong.

And the said Court do hereby declare this opinion, after the investigation of the matter, and after putting the interrogatories presented by the War Department, that the above named applicant was a Revolutionary - a soldier, and send as he states - that the Court further certify that it appears to them that William Moody and Peter Bushong who have signed the foregoing certificate are residents in the town of Columbia - Columbia County Ohio - and are credible persons, and that the document is entitled to credit.

I Charles D Coffin Clerk of the Court of Common Pleas for said county, do hereby certify by this the foregoing contains the original proceedings of the said Court, in the matter of the application of George R. Daybrook for a pension.

Dear Madam:

The data which follow in regard to George F. Dayhoff were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, R. 2782, based upon his services in the War of the Revolution.

George F. Dayhoff (as his signature is shown in the claim) was born November 5, 1761, in Cadore(?) Township, York County, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents are not given.

While residing in said Township, George F. Dayhoff enlisted and served two months in Captain William Deed's company, under Major William Astor, with the Pennsylvania troops, no dates of service given.

He moved from York County, Pennsylvania, some time in 1812, to Ohio. He applied for pension August 15, 1832, then a resident of the town of Columbiana, Columbiana County, Ohio.

for a The claim for pension was not allowed, as the Act of June 7, 1832, under which he applied did not *provide* grant pension for a service of less than six months, and he claimed to have served but two months.

The papers on file in this claim contain no discernible data in regard to family.
