The State of Ohio Columbia & County Jr. On the fifteenth day of
August 1832, personally appeared before me George P. Dalyhoop,
the People of the County of said County aforesaid, George P.
Dalyhoop a resident of Columbia town in said County of
Columbia and State aforesaid aged 71 years the 5th November
last, who being first duly sworn according to law, doth on
his oath make the following declaration, in order to obtain
the benefit of the Act of Congress passed the 1st. June 1832.
That he entered the service of the United States under the
following name of James M. and the
following rank of Major, and served as his state, &c. until
January 1st on the 5th day of November 1784 in Columbia
County York County State of Pennsylvania. Was
elected as the Notary of said County by resolution of a
call was made for this elect to send its town - I ac-
cordingly marched to Little York - I served under the
following officers - William Dade - Major William
Atston, Adjutant - Hogg - Commissioned Army doctor,
Quartermaster - Wilson - The contine in York County
until my term of two months service had expired - I
received my discharge from Major Atston. It run in this
march - "Camp security I am satisfied that George
P. Dalyhoop has served his full time at the Mulin
the Camp of York County A.M.C. 1832."

Ans. I was living in Cadiz Township
Portage County, Pennsylvania, at which place
I lived until I came to this state which was
on the 14th day of April 1812, and I now live
in the town of Columbia Columbia County O.

4. How long you called into service.

Ans. I was drafted for two months,

who were with the troops, when you served; and such
contested and militia Regiments as you can
recall. State the general circumstances of your
service - There were no regular officers except an Adj'tant
General - Captain Wm. Godd, Major Storer,
Adj'tant - Hagg - Commissary, Major Miller
and Quartermaster - Major General recollect
any continental or militia Regiments and the Cir-
cumstances of service are fully detailed in my depositions.

6. - Will you give an account of discharge from the
service, and if so, by whom was it given and what
has become of it?

Ans. Rec'd a discharge from Major
Storer, and what has become of it I cannot tell.

7. State the names of some persons to whom
you are known in your present neighborhood,
and who can testify as to your character for
veracity, and the belief is to you him as
a soldier of the Revolution -

And the said Court do hereby decline the application
for investigation of the matter, and after putting the
interrogatories presented by the War Department,
that the above named applicant was a Revolution
Army soldier, and said as he states - And the Court
further certifies that it appears to the said William
Moody and Pete Bushong who have signed the
foregoing certificate are residents in the town of Columbia
in Columbia County Ohio - and are creditable
persons, and that the statement is entitled to credit.

Common Pleas for said county do hereby certi-
fy that the foregoing contains the original proceedings
of the said Court, in the matter of the application
of George P. Dayhoff for a pension.

Dear Madam:

The data which follow in regard to George P. Dayhoff were obtained from papers on file in pension claim, R. 2788, based upon his service in the War of the Revolution.

George P. Dayhoff (as his signature is shown in the claim) was born November 5, 1761, in Cidores(?) Township, York County, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents are not given.

While residing in said Township, George P. Dayhoff enlisted and served two months in Captain William Dodd's company, under Major William Aston, with the Pennsylvania troops, no dates of service given.

He moved from York County, Pennsylvania, sometime in 1812, to Ohio. He applied for pension August 15, 1838, then a resident of the town of Columbiaville, Columbiaville County, Ohio.

The claim for pension was not allowed, as the Act of June 7, 1838, under which he applied did not provide for pension for service of less than six months, and he claimed to have served but two months.

The papers on file in this claim contain no discernible data in regard to family.

Mr Haleys letter and in reply to the
enquiring Gentlemen whom he states
that Geo P Day has asserted a claim
to a pension under the act of 7 June
1832 which was on the 15 of Decemr
of that year rejected.

In his declaration he
claimed to have served but two months
only. The act of 7 June 1832 does not
grant a pension for service less than
6 months. As he bears a generality to his
own statement but two months, his
application has, of course disallowed.

Reference is made to your letter in which you state that your great great grandfather was Henry Dehoff, born in 1789, in Columbiana County, Ohio, that his ancestors may have come from New York, or Holland. You request that the Revolutionary War records of this office be searched for the record of any soldier with surname "Dehoff".

The Revolutionary War records of this office have been searched and no claim for pension found based upon service of a soldier with surname "Dehoff"; nor do the War of 1812 records show a claim for pension on file on account of the service of any soldier with surname Dehoff, Dehoff, or Deyhoff.

The Revolutionary War records of Abraham Dehoff, John Dehoff, and George Deyhoff, are furnished you herewith. It is hoped that these records will be of interest to you.

is estimated at 6 mos while Christian Ham-
mer to whose case Mr. May refers, computes
