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Declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the act of Congress of the 7th June
1832.

State of Tennessee
Swain County

On this 10th day of December 1833. Personally appeared
before me John M. Anderson an acting Justice of the Peace
for said County Alexander Gollinger of said
State & County, aged 45 years & 9 months who being
first duly sworn according to Law doth on his oath
make the following Declaration in order to obtain the
benefit of the act of Congress passed June 7th 1832

That he was drafted and entered the service of the
United States in August or September 1758, and
served as a Private under the command of Major
William Boyl. Capt. Harry & Lieut. Stewart.

Said applicant states that he resided in the
State of Pennsylvania York County when he entered
said service that he then followed at York Penn
in said State marched from said Penn 10 miles
to Susquehanna River & received some British Prisoners
on said River & kept said Prisoners under guard
three months & then said applicant returned home
in York County being regularly discharged on the
month of November 1758.

Said applicant states he was not out of York City
& was in no engagements
Said Declarant States he was born in Pennsylvania
York City March 25th 1736

Said applicant states he has lost his Discharge
and has no Documentary Evidence to sustain his
Claim and that he knows of no Person whose
Testimony he can procure who can testify to his
Service

Said applicant states he has a record of
his age at his residence that he now lives in
the State of Tennessee & Swain County and has
resided in said State of Tennessee 22 years
& previous thereto he resided in Virginia
Said applicant states that Capt. Harry gave
him his Discharge

Said Applicant hereby relinquishes every
Claim whether to a Person or amount except
the Present, and declares his name is not
on the Pension roll of the Army of any State
I swear to & subscribed the Day & year

State of Tennessee & Declaration

Swain County To obtain a Pension

on this 25th day of December 1843

Personally appeared Alexander Zollinger a resident of Swain County in the County of Swain and State of Tennessee aged Eighty three years in March last 1843 who being duly sworn according to law doth on his oath make the following Declaration in order to obtain the benefit of the act of Congress passed 7th June 1832 that he entered the service of the United States under the following named officers and served therein after stated: under Major William Haver Coffin Henry his being name not recalled Lieutenant Christopher Zinn and seven months his being name not name recalled that he entered the service of the United States about the last days of May or first days of June 1781 or 1782 not certain which and served faithfully for three months that he was in no engagements that he resided in the State of Pennsylvania York County that he served as a substitute in the place of Henry Bomar that he served in Pennsylvania York County Lancaster County that he served with ~~the~~ Washington's Regiment that he recalls none of the names of any of regular officers of the army whom he served with

After the expiration of three months he was discharged and came home & he was at home a half six weeks and he entered the service a gain as a volunteer to go with the baggage wagon & the wagoners name was Albrite & Peter Zollinger Jacob Bauers John Bauers & William Baily & Nicholas Green i was living in the State of Pennsylvania York County when he entered the service the 2 time & we marched to the State of Jersey & from there to New York a gain served faithfully for three months and three weeks and a gain was discharged and came home ^{the whole amount of his service is six months three weeks} & that he has no documentary evidence and that he knows of no person in this part of the Country who knows any thing about his service in the army

He hereby relinquishes every claim whatever to a pension or gratuity except this present one and Declares that his name is not on the pension list of the army of any state or territory in the United States

question state the names of persons to whom
you are known in your neighborhood

veracity and the belief of your services as a soldier
of the revolution

and I Samuel Bogart an acting justice of

of Tennessee do declare that after the investigation
of the matter and after putting the interrogatories
prescribed by the war department that the above
named applicant was a revolutionary soldier and
and served as he states and that he further
believes that the applicant for the pension
suffers from age and bodily infirmity
is unable to attend court and the sd justice further
certifies that it appears to him that Daniel
Layman who has signed the preceding certificate
is a clergyman resident in the county of Sevier
and state of Tennessee and that
who has also signed the same is a resident in
the county of Sevier county and state of Tennessee

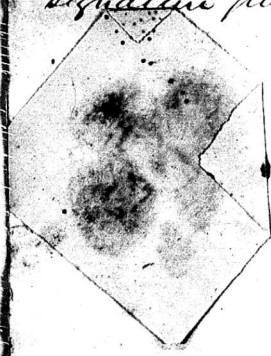

Dear Madam:

Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of soldiers with the name John (Hans) Zollinger or Sollinger, and all other soldiers of the Revolution with that surname.

Revolutionary War data furnished by the Veterans Administration are obtained from claims for pension and bounty land which have been made to the United States based upon service of soldiers in that war.

The Revolutionary War records of this office have been searched and two claims for pension, only, found based upon service in that war of soldiers with the surname you cite - those of Alexander and Peter which follow.

ALEXANDER ZOLLINGER
R. 11998

The data which follow in regard to Alexander Zollinger were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, R. 11998, based upon his service in the Revolutionary War.

Alexander Zollinger was born in York or Philadelphia County, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents were not given. Before moving to Tennessee he resided in Virginia.

While residing in Sevier County, Tennessee, where he had been living twenty-two years, Alexander Zollinger applied for pension December 10, 1838, aged seventy-five years nine months, and alleged that while living in York County, Pennsylvania, he volunteered in May or June, 1781 or 1782, and served three months as private in Captain Furry's company in the Pennsylvania troops; that upon the

expiration of that tour, he returned to his home where he remained about six weeks, then volunteered to go with the baggage wagons from York, Pennsylvania, to New Jersey, and that he was engaged in that service three months three weeks. One Peter Zollinger served on that tour with him, his relationship to Alexander Zollinger not stated.

Alexander Zollinger's claim for pension was not allowed as he did not allege or prove six months' service in a regular military organization which was required by the pension law.

No reference was made in the claim to wife or children of this soldier and the date of his death is not shown.

PETER ZOLLINGER
S. 8005

The data furnished herein were obtained from pension claim, S. 8005, based upon military service of Peter Zollinger in the Revolutionary War.

Peter Zollinger was born December 22, 1756, in Germantown, Pennsylvania. The names of his parents were not given.

Peter Zollinger, at the commencement of the Revolution, was an ensign in the militia in Paradise Township, York County, Pennsylvania; he volunteered sometime in June, 1776, and served three months as private in Captain Nicholas Bittinger's company, Colonel Richard McAllister's Pennsylvania regiment; upon his return home, he was elected captain of a company which was called out in 1777, was in the battle of Germantown under Colonel Bull and served three months; he later marched his company to York, Pennsylvania, and served six weeks. He was appointed sometime in May, 1778, to command a brigade of wagons under Colonel Jefferies, Wagonmaster General, and served four months. He served at various times in pursuit of Indians, no details of this service given.

Peter Zollinger was allowed pension on his application executed May 23, 1838, at which time he was living in Frederick County, Maryland.

The wife of Peter Zollinger, her name not shown, died prior to October, 1838; he then moved to Adams County, Pennsylvania, to live

with his son-in-law, Zephaniah Herbert. He returned to Frederick County, Maryland, in the month of November, 1888, having married "a woman of the State of Maryland", her name not stated.

Peter Zollinger died November 4, 1848, at the residence of his daughter, Barbara Carlley, in McKessentown, Adams County, Pennsylvania. He left no widow, but the following children survived him:

Elisabeth Crabbs, a widow
Barbara, widow of Reuben B. Carlley
Mary, wife of Zephaniah Herbert
George Zollinger
John Zollinger who died prior to 1861, leaving a widow, Ellen,
and nine children, names of children not stated.

 objection founded upon the contradictory
 statements of his service, it is sufficient
 to remark that the ^{is before} term of service
 in the Deo militia set forth in both
 declarations which he estimated at
 3 months while the British laws of Pa
 limited it to 2 months - He now
 claims to have "volunteered to go with
 the baggage waggons from York Pa to
 N. J." and served some 3 months -
 This was not military service - & would
 not with the 2 mo tour be sufficient
 to entitle him even if it were
 military in the purview of the British
 laws -
